TARWIN LANDCARE GROUP.

The unseasonably warm weather and the opportunity to use Sunny the e-bus made for a fun AGM for Tarwin Landcare Group' (TLG) last week.

The 'garden-hop' began at Van Cleef Reserve where TLG committee member, Deb Kraushofer, described the work being done there by a dedicated group of volunteers and members of the South Gippsland Shire Council's (SGSC) Environment Team. A walk through the Reserve revealed the huge amount of



thought and effort that has gone into creating a special place for Venus Bay residents and visitors to enjoy. Highlights include a gathering place, which hosted a very special Welcome to Country last year, and a stone table and chairs which proved to be surprisingly comfortable.

Next stop was Sue Peterson's nearby property where the shade cast by stunning bansias, hakeas and eucalypts was much appreciated. Everyone enjoyed Sue's stories about creating her calm and restful garden which includes many plants she has propagated herself.

The final stop was Debbie and Nick's garden which features in a series of videos created by TLG to celebrate local native gardens. Created with the assistance of an SGSC Community Grant, the videos share the history, challenges and keys to success of six very different properties in Venus Bay, Walkerville, Tarwin Lower and Middle Tarwin. The videos have just been released and are available on the <u>Tarwin Landcare Group's Facebook page</u>.

TLG celebrated several other achievements at its AGM. It has initiated a long-term project to restore the

Tarwin River and removed around 500 deer and a similar number of foxes from Cape Liptrap. It has also received funding through the Victorian Landcare Grants to revegetate the escarpment below Flock Stock and Basil (the farmgate business on the bend as you come into Tarwin Lower from Inverloch). This partnership project will involve TLG, Anna and Chris from Flock Stock and Basil and students from Tarwin Lower Primary School.

TLG also delivered more than 12 events over the year including a history walk at



Tarwin Meadows that attracted 80 participants, a rabbit control workshop, a visit to the Bald Hills Wind Farm and a Pest to Paddock day that produced 55kg of delicious venison sausages.

TLG has heaps of activities planned for the next twelve months and invites people living, farming or

For the love of the Tarwin

SUNNY – our Venus Bay community electric mini bus has been on the road now for about 9 months. We continue to look at ways to improve all aspects of the project – from engagement with our volunteer drivers, booking systems, the options people can use to book the service and all the other factors that go into making this project successful and sustainable.

The project objectives are to test how a community-run transport service might work in small regional communities where other forms of public transport are not viable or available. As you may know, both Sandy Point and Venus Bay are part of this trial project. Each community has unique features which inform how the service works in each location.

We've tried quite a few things to date, and have learned a lot along with way!!. We've hosted a couple of early engagement forums to get community input on what might work for our community. We recently held a feedback forum for community members and another for our volunteer drivers so we can work on continual improvement.

A snapshot of what we have heard so far:

- People really love the project and think it is needed here
- While they may support the project, they may not use it (yet)
- The booking system is difficult to use and understand (we know this, and are about to trial a new approach)
- Some people don't know about it how can they find out?
- That the human touch element particularly from our wonderful engagement officer Bill is critical to the early stages of the project
- Some people don't like or trust electric vehicles (we want to find out more about that)
- The outings are wonderful
- Drivers and passengers reported enjoying the social aspect including meeting new people
- Where is the money going for outings (we are using this to pay for elements of the service)
- It's not funded by the Shire
- Lots of suggestions about outings (to local events, markets, new places)
- The regular timetable is confusing
- It will take some time to work and for people to know about it/understand it
- The service only operates when there are bookings (so we can coordinate drivers)

PLEASE continue to help us understand YOUR point of view of this service so we can continue to make improvements.

La Trobe University is undertaking the research element of the project – along with project partners iMove Corporate Research Centre and Department of Transport & Planning – in order to develop a business case over 2 years. This will inform the government and other rural communities on future policy development with regards to community mobility services.

DO YOU QUALIFY FOR FREEE INTERNET?

We've been asked to let our community members know about this program:

I'm reaching out from Tom McIntosh MP's office, State Member for Eastern Victoria, to let you know about an important program that is being rolled out which will benefit families with school aged children. As Neighbourhood Houses, we feel you are well placed to help us get the word out about this to families who really need it.

This program includes:

- Free home internet until December 2025
- Free WI-FI router (they can keep it)
- Unlimited data
- 50/20 plan (this is a typical household plan)
- No lock in contracts
- Choice of participating internet providers
- Ongoing support from the National Referral Centre to apply callback, webchat, and interpreting services available

To be eligible for the program, applicants:

- Must be caring for a school age student at your home.
- Must not have an active NBN connection at your home now or in the past 14 days. (Having a mobile internet service does not affect eligibility).
- Must live in property that can access the NBN network through a standard connection.

Mycelia Energy Collective – Initiative on hold



In our previous two Matter of Fact newsletters, we shared news about an opportunity for our community members to join the Mycelia Energy Collective retail energy offer. Unfortunately, this initiative is currently unavailable after the recent collapse of energy retailer Circular Energy. Mycelia is currently seeking a new retail energy supplier so they can continue with the good work and offering benefits to communities.

Our sincere apologies for any inconvenience these changes may have caused! This news came as quite a surprise and the team at Mycelia are working as quickly as possible to respond.

What happened to Circular Energy?

We have yet to receive a statement from Circular Energy to provide to our customers. What we do know is Circular Energy was unable to remain financially viable as a small retailer in the highly volatile wholesale energy market. Prolonged periods of high cloud coverage and low wind has meant much lower amounts of solar and wind energy have been available and so the energy market's reliance on coal and gas fired energy has increased. Wind and solar energy are the cheapest forms of energy, and coal is the most expensive (followed by gas), so energy retailers experienced major spikes in the price of energy they bought from the market. Like many small retailers, Circular Energy does not own their own generation assets and so the prolonged high wholesale energy pricing was more than they would withstand. They are one of several small retailers that have been driven out of the market in this way.



SELECTING AN ENERGY RETAILER - WHERE TO BEGIN?

While Mycelia Energy Collective focussed on a commitment to renewable energy, model of care, Australian owned, competitive pricing and benefits to community – we all need an energy retailer.

Community Energy Retailers

If community energy is your thing, then ethical retailers like <u>CoPower</u> and <u>Indigo Power</u> are worth checking out. They might cost a little more, but this at least you can rest assured that your money is supporting community participation in the energy transition.

Victorian Energy Compare

The <u>Victorian Energy Compare website</u> is also a useful tool for comparing the different plans available. Just make sure you have a copy of an old electricity bill with your NMI number handy.




In the meantime, Venus Bay Community Centre remains committed to the Strategic Partnership agreement we have created with Mycelia Renewables. We continue to work on progressing activities that support the Community Plan for Community Energy that was developed with the communities of Venus Bay & Tarwin Lower.

Along with project partner Heather Smith, we are looking at the development and implementation of the community battery case with both Victorian State Government and AUSNET. Potential sites identified in the Community Plan for Community Energy demonstrate the Tarwin Precinct site is the most urgent priority for consideration. It's grant application time – with opportunities for Resilience funding – our project team continues to progress opportunities to see implementation of the plan.

Along with this work, we have attended the Neighbourhood Batteries: Business Case Development training delivered by DEECA and Yarra Energy Foundation. Gradually, pieces of the puzzle are coming together – often this is the invisible work that goes on behind the scenes, in meetings and relationship building with potential partners, funders and key stakeholders.

Additionally, we are looking forward to collaborating with others to provide information, training and opportunities to learn more about household efficiency and the pathways of household, business and community engagement with renewable energy. -these are detailed in the Community Plan for Community Energy.
